Becoming Muhammad Ali

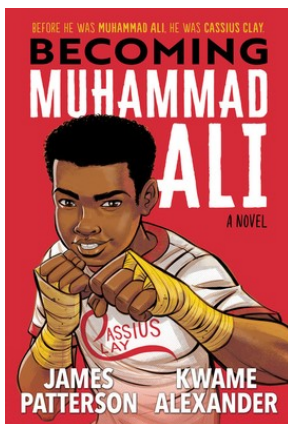
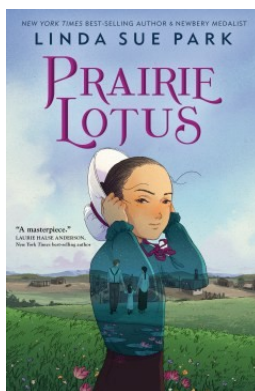

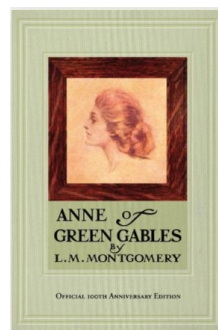

Ninth Ward by Jewell Parker Rhodes

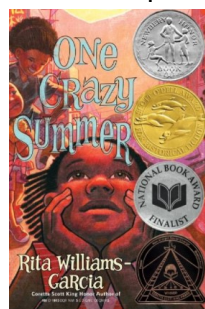
